*The Picky Eagle: How Democracy and Xenophobia Limited U.S. Territorial Expansion* (Cornell University Press, 2020)

Why did the United States stop annexing territory? In contrast to profit-driven theories of conquest and histories depicting a switch from territorial to commercial expansion, I argue that U.S. leaders consistently worried about annexation's domestic political and normative consequences. Democracy and xenophobia interacted in driving them to reject sharing self-government with alien populations, a widespread consensus that informed much subsequent U.S. foreign policy. Across 23 detailed case studies of policymaking between 1774 and 1898, this book explains why the United States expanded where it did and—just as importantly—why it did not expand where it didn't.

What explains variations in U.S. support for international law? Using a new five-part conceptualization of support, this book examines areas including conquest, international courts, nuclear proliferation, use of force, trade, human rights, war crimes, torture, targeted killings, law of the sea, environmental politics, and cybersecurity. The findings illuminate patterns and help us understand paradoxical cases in which the United States supports international law in one way while undermining it in another.

Using the editors' new framework for American exceptionalism, this book clarifies its relationships with concepts already familiar to IR scholars including liberalism, religion, race, nationalism, status, and great power politics. Later chapters explore its relationship with U.S. foreign policy traditions, security policy, economic policy, international law, foreign policy in the Global South, and domestic partisan polarization.
