I indicated that I needed help with chemistry in the learning-self assessment. I study a lot more and look through my notes often and I am doing a lot better with it. Some strategies I have implemented have been doing study groups and working with my classmates to figure out topics we may not quite understand.

I don't really have any other majors I am thinking about pursuing. A minor I am very interested in is Spanish because it is something that will be very useful in the healthcare field. I do speak Spanish, but I want to be more confident in it and be able to put it on my resume. I just want to be able to speak it confidently and professionally and I think a minor in that would be beneficial.

We usually all look at the problem together and figure out what could work best. I am hoping that next semester I will have more time to go to interest meetings and find something to be a part of.
