Three pieces of information that resonated with me from Mr. Miller's dialogue were the comparisons between working for a local government vs. the military, the advantages of working in Cybersecurity, and the significance of having a technical background and skills for your specific goals.

Each path demands unique skills and varying levels of specialization, so I can choose one that aligns with my strengths and interests. Jobs at the top of this field also offer high salaries, allowing me to work my way up while gaining valuable life skills and securing a successful future. In conclusion, three key takeaways
