
The First 50 Hours: Tutorial Videos and Speaker Applications

Reflection #1

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The first 50 hours of my internship have been primarily focused on creating tutorial videos for the product website. My portion of the videos has been focused on demonstrating how WhiteRabbitNeo, an uncensored, open-source, red-team AI model, can help automate different cybersecurity tasks. I also created a video series about configuring and utilizing Kindo's AI models with the Continue extension in VS Code and JetBrains. These videos have been uploaded to Kindo's YouTube, as well as on the product as in-application training videos. One of my videos was also shared on Kindo's LinkedIn, and I've attached an image of the post below. The most challenging aspects of creating these tutorials were coming up with different applications and recording the voiceovers.



Aside from the tutorial videos, I have also been working on submitting Call for Papers (CFPs) for different cybersecurity conferences. So far, I have only applied to PDX BSides in Portland, Oregon, but I will be applying to more conferences in the coming weeks. My manager has also requested for me to attend Chicago BSides in November, so I have begun planning for that trip.

The primary challenge of the first 50 hours of my internship has been to balance working part-time alongside a full course load. One thing I did to make this easier was to dedicate a specific day each week to work through the majority of my internship tasks, rather than trying to do everything each day.
