## Reflection

When learning Spanish, I had expected it to be harder than anticipated. Learning a new language can always prove to be challenging but I was confident that I would focus on the content of the language to learn the languages structure easily. Since I took French in high school, and Spanish has some similarities with French, it was easily to understand the basics of the language but there were man challenges faced along the way.

The beginning of learning the language was easy to grasp. Most of what we were learning was the structure of Masculine and Feminine which is what I compared to French and used as a similarity. We learned basic conversation starters and about how to great each other and talk about ourselves as well as our families and things we like do. The most difficult task for me was the pronunciation of certain letters that sound different then the English alphabet. Practicing reading and understanding sentences helped on being able to translate phrases from Spanish to English properly without misconception of words and made it easier to remember certain vocabulary that was needed frequently in our activities.

There are many Spanish speakers in America which makes me feel more confident in being able to speak this language outside of the course I will be taking and use to engage in the outside world.
