Throughout this course, I came across a wide range of thought-provoking material. Covering many different situations that bring to question the ethical and moral implications of someone's action. This course explored topics of privacy, data ethics, whistleblowing, corporate social responsibility, professional ethics, cyber conflict, and information warfare. Each topic brought forth different types of ethical and moral complexities. Proving that ethics is a complex topic that everyone can interpret differently. In the process of analyzing these topics, there were various ethical perspectives explored in this course. This introduced new perspectives as well as a new way of understanding how society functions. Examining the topics from a different ethical perspective to break down the topics more deeply. The three major topics I engaged with in this course were data ethics, whistleblowing, and virtue ethics.

In order to engage with the topic of data ethics we had to investigate the collection of user data by companies. I argued that the collection of user data by companies can quickly turn unethical. This depends on the manner in which the companies are collecting the data as well as what data they are collecting. Everyone's user data is collected by most companies whether they know it or not. Which can lead to the user's rights being violated. This is done when the companies misappropriate user data or are selling the users' data to other companies.

Prior to taking this course and exploring this topic, I didn't know much about data ethics. Looking more into user data and the potential ethical issues shocked me. For most of my life, I have never really paid attention to what companies are allowed to do thinking that they would act in an ethical manner. Whistleblowing is a complex ethical topic because it can be tricky to determine if the person is acting in a moral and just way. Before this class, my only knowledge of whistleblowing was the Snowden case. Going into this topic, I knew that whistleblowing was a topic that many disagree on depending on the way you see it. In my stance, Snowden was moral and acting out of the interest of public welfare. While this could be argued by many that he was trying to expose the government in a malicious way.

Learning more about the topic allowed me to back up my overall opinion about whistleblowing. Allowing me to touch on the topic in a more nuanced way that better backed up my opinion. I was able to understand the complexities of loyalty and its role in whistleblowing. When attempting to understand whistleblowing you have to determine what loyalty means in a corporate setting. Depending on a person's understanding of
