An interdisciplinary study of LGBTQ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer) experiences that introduces students to personal, cultural, and political aspects of queer life while examining social forces such as heteronormativity, social construction of gender, and homophobia.

Focuses on issues of particular importance to LGBTQ people while exploring gender and encouraging examination of the many ways in which sexuality intersects with gender, race, ethnicity, class, age, ability and other identities.

How do we define queer? Who/how is queer? What are the benefits/limitations of the concept of queer? What tensions exist between lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender movements? How do race/gender/class intersect with sexuality? How and why have queer histories, experiences, activities, and knowledge been rendered invisible?

PARTICIPATION


