Reflective Journal 3:

This journal marks the 150-hour point of my internship at the Brooks Crossing Innovation Lab as a cybersecurity intern. As time progressed from my previous journal entries, the whole ILab became quite different from my initial expectations. The workload, responsibilities, and day-to-day operations are on a level I could not have predicted.
