the NIST SP 800-171 and being complaint with those requirements. As an intern for WTI, getting prepared for the CMMC (Cybersecurity Maturity Model Certification) CCP (Certified CMMC Professional) has been a priority. As a qualified CCP, you can help with assessments in advising in compliance and in the organization of these assessments under a qualified CCA (CMMC Certified Assessor). Another benefit in the intern position is getting advice on your professional resume and establishing a network within the ecosystem of the CMMC.

In my last reflection, I spoke about how I was able to learn how to use and navigate using Microsoft Defender and Sentinel. It is beneficial to learn and use these applications as they are primarily used for security management. I am excited to use this skillset and apply on a resume; there are positions that require experience with Defender or Sentinel. As far as problem solving is concerned, there was another opportunity to see how an audit could be performed and generating weekly reports about finding from these security managers.
