Our motivation is similar to gas in our car tank, when it isn't fueled by something it runs out and when it runs out you can't move. Although you don't literally stop moving, think about it. In his address Denzel quotes Nelson Mandela by saying "Nelson Mandela said there is no passion to be found playing small and settling for a life that's less than the one you're capable of living" he says this to dare his listeners to dream big and to live a life they are capable of living (Washington 00:07:11- 00:08:02). The best part of it all is that he is credible to speak on this topic. He knows what it feels like to be in listeners' shoes. That is why his

message of "fall forward" makes so much sense, he saw how falling forward and going all in on his dreams panned out (Washington 00:07:11- 00:08:02).
