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## **Introduction**

I am currently a senior at Old Dominion University working towards getting my bachelors degree in cybersecurity. I currently hold a 3.6 grade point average and have passed all my classes, completing my bachelors degree within two years. ### **Making my choice**

While Governor's School was a blessing that helped me financially, after graduating I started to see the tradeoffs. ### **Reflection & Thoughts**

By reframing my perspective in this way I can release the unnecessary pressure I place on myself and instead focus on embracing the complexities and nuances of my own unique life story.
