The course materials, discussions, quizzes, and additional readings. These resources give a solid foundation for understanding not just how to write well for digital platforms, but also how to think, engage, and succeed in connected environments. In today's ever-changing digital world, communication is not just straightforward or fixed. Audiences skim, scroll, click, and juggle tasks across different platforms, expecting content that is clear, easy to access, and instantly relevant. This infographic highlights the weekly readings from Miller's "Writing for Digital Media," Rheingold's "Net Smart," and other readings from this course, displaying information in a visually structured, easy-to-scan format that reflects real-life digital reading habits. The four headings create a hierarchy, with key ideas that are broken down for better understanding. The basic layout of this infographic starts from the bottom and moves to the top. This highlights any project you begin, starting from the bottom, progressing your way up to the top. The infographic is not just a visual summary; it serves as a practical example of how effective digital writing and clever online interaction help people express themselves clearly, analyze information critically, and succeed in a connected world.

This digital poster demonstrates how attention literacy and participation in the public sphere are essential foundations of effective digital writing, reinforced through intentional visual rhetoric and structured design choices. I decided to concentrate on "Attention Literacy" and the "Public Sphere," because they transformed my perspective on online participation and made me more aware of my intentions. Although the course was brief, each week was filled with foundational concepts in digital writing. With various concepts and learning the fundamentals of digital writing. Starting with week one. We acquired the skills necessary to navigate, assess, and produce information through digital literacy and virtual communities effectively and critically. In the second week. We focused on building an online community and influencing others through digital

authorship and digital rhetoric. The third week revolved around the public sphere. Coming together to discuss ideas, express opinions, and debate issues that can impact society. In the final two weeks, we explored visual rhetoric and accessibility. For websites and designs using visual elements. To bring your vision to life.

This journey of becoming a digital writing expert is a powerful growth experience, enabling you to lead, influence, and make your voice count online. The challenge of becoming a digital writing expert pushes you to refine your visual voice, confidently participate in public discussions, and acquire the digital literacy skills necessary to stand out and lead in today's online and non-online environments. The two ideas I want to discuss come from Rheingold's articles "Attention Literacy" and "Public Sphere" because I found the process of working on the remix analysis paper interesting.

The idea of quickly becoming an expert in digital writing depends on your learning style. You can sprint right to the top, skip the first race, or even the second race. You might start at the beginning and then skip the second and third races. It all depends on your learning curves, and those curves can be quite tricky. 😊

At the beginning of the track, I skipped the second track and raced straight towards the third track. Nowadays, the internet can lead anyone to believe that everything they encounter online is factual and increasingly credible. Attention literacy involves grasping how to control and optimize your focus and attention in a world overflowing with distractions. *Howard Rheingold emphasizes the concept of "attention literacy," which is increasingly relevant in our fast-paced, information-rich world. He describes attention literacy as "paying attention to your intention" (p. 77).* The public sphere is the shared social space where significant discussions that impact the community can happen openly. When you write in the public sphere, you are working within a broad situational context. This requires a wide understanding of the current events and issues that your readers are

aware of. As Rheingold puts it, "You need to understand the political and economic environments in which technology-mediated behavior is embedded" (p. 240).

For the infographic image placement, I raced to the last track. Visual rhetoric refers to the use of visual elements (typography, images, whitespace, etc.) *Setting up a page with a clear visual hierarchy also improves readability because it guides readers through the content, providing cues for what to pay attention to first, second, and so forth, which improves their ability to quickly scan the page (Miller 431).*

On the left side, various vehicles symbolize options and advancement, highlighting the idea of movement and personal development. Cars are symbols of choice, growth, and different learning paths within digital writing. Each vehicle symbolizes a different pace, skill level, or approach to learning, showing that there is not just one way to grow in digital writing.

- **Sports Car (Red)** – Represents ambition, speed, and confidence in digital spaces.
- **Convertible/Jeep** – Symbolizes flexibility and creativity in writing and design.
- **SUV** – Reflects reliability and steady development of foundational skills.
- **Van** – Suggests collaboration and community engagement.
- **School Bus** – Represents learning, growth, and shared educational experiences.

The layout uses a clear visual hierarchy to guide attention from the bottom of the page upward, mirroring the racing theme of progress and forward movement. Larger, bold headings signal major concepts, while smaller supporting text provides clarification. The bold color contrast ensures readability while symbolizing energy and progress, visually reinforcing the idea that digital writing requires awareness and purposeful engagement. I started by brainstorming and looking through every week of this short course. I found a main theme that would visually show growth and

success. I picked a racing theme because it symbolizes progress, momentum, and arriving at a goal.

In conclusion, this course has taught me that being a strong digital writer is not about finishing first, but about learning to navigate the journey with intention. Through concepts from Cara Miller's *Writing for Digital Media* and Howard Rheingold's *Net Smart*, I have realized that effective digital communication needs intention, awareness, and flexibility. Attention literacy has shown me to be careful about where I focus my attention and how I interact with information, while the concept of the public sphere has broadened my view of writing to engage in bigger social and political discussions.

Creating the infographic helped reinforce these ideas. By incorporating visual hierarchy, symbolism, and a racing theme to illustrate growth, I used visual rhetoric principles in a way that mirrors how audiences read and engage online. The various vehicles represent that there is not just one way to become a skilled digital writer; everyone's progress looks different based on their learning style, speed, and objectives.

In the end, this course has enhanced my ability to think critically, write with purpose, and design thoughtfully. Digital writing goes beyond just creating content; it involves engaging responsibly in connected environments, shaping discussions, and making meaningful contributions to the public sphere.
