

I, Special Agent Jaeden Chappell, have been duly sworn and state the following:

1. I serve as a Special Agent in the Cyber Division of the FBI and have been a federal law enforcement officer. My work involves investigating cases of online fraud, identity theft, and computer hacking; I'm also an expert in the kinds of statute-enforcement cases that fall under 18 U.S.C. § 1343 (Wire Fraud).
2. This affidavit supports the issuance of a search warrant for the premises located at 619 E Plume Street, Apartment 3A, Norfolk, Virginia 23510, the home of Richard Frankfurter, and for the examination of any computer equipment found therein, to determine whether Mr. Frankfurter is engaged in online fraud.
3. On or about January 15, 2025, the Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) took in several consumer complaints about a website that called itself "GetCashFast.com." This site, the complainants told the IC3, was a front for advertising financial services and products that were never delivered to the complainants. The site was, in essence, a con. The agents of the IC3 who were looking into the complaints spent some time tracing the site back to its real owners.
4. The domain registrar received a federal subpoena and turned over account logs and IP addresses that were associated with administrative access to GetCashFastFast.com. The logs showed that there had been numerous unsuccessful attempts to log in to the account and that these attempts were coming from an IP address that was registered to Cox Communications and assigned to Richard Frankfurter's residence.
5. Surveillance carried out in March 2025 established that Richard Frankfurter lives at the Norfolk address. On several different times, Frankfurter was seen going in and out of the abode, carrying what seemed to be a silver Dell laptop, and using a smartphone that was assumed of being an iPhone.
6. Based on my training and experience, I believe that people who commit online fraud keep digital records of all kinds of things. These include not just the transactions but also all kinds of administration and communication with their victims. They also keep records of their finances and all kinds of digital identity materials. This is usually found on computers and smartphones, but also on storage devices and online platforms. The reason I said I believe this is because I can't say that I've seen this across the board for every online fraud case. But I have seen more than a few that fit this pattern.
7. It follows that I think proof of internet fraud will be found at the subject residence. Such proof will consist of digital devices, documents, and account credentials.

I declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and belief.
