Reflection Essay

Introduction

Throughout this course, we have been preparing ourselves to create and finalize our ePortfolios. I have found myself challenged in finding the right artifacts to include, but have also been allowed to be reflective looking back on past courses and assignments. In my ePortfolio I chose to specifically highlight three skills which are skills in Research, Analysis, and Critical Thinking and Comprehension. I believe that these skills are essential, and that the artifacts I included portray my effectiveness in them.

Research Skills

The first artifact under my Research Skills tab that I chose to include was a powerpoint research presentation I did in my course Social Science and Crime Mapping. Throughout this course, we worked on various assignments using the ArcGIS system to create maps based on data. In this assignment, I was able to read an article about the correlation between hurricanes and domestic abuse, all while researching and analyzing the data. The second artifact under my Research skills tab that I chose to include was a paper about the rising topic in the cybersecurity world, Artificial Intelligence. The third artifact under my Research Skills tab that I chose to include was a paper I wrote regarding a cyber incident. This assignment required me to use my research skills among others including analysis. To me, this assignment also shows my growth as a writer and researcher. Analytical Skills

The first artifact I chose to show under my Analytical Skills tab was a writing assignment where I had to analyze a job ad in the field that I wish to work in. This assignment allowed me to analyze a job posting and see what skills I already had and what skills I would need to acquire in order to get a job in the field I desired. This assignment allowed me to see how my studies have prepared me for life after college, and also allowed me to gain skills that would help the eventual job hunting process easier.

The second artifact I chose to show under my Analytical Skills tab was a case analysis on privacy. This assignment required me to analyze a case presented alongside the teachings and theories of certain authors. This assignment was in my Cybersecurity Ethics class, a class that has definitely grown my analytical skills. My own professor noted the growth in my analysis and

writing between just my first and second case analysis. This class has allowed me to grow and develop a much needed skill, especially in the field of cybersecurity.

The third artifact I chose was a writing assignment where I had to analyze a text in regards to moral reasoning. This particular moral reasoning was that of Confucianism. Critical Thinking and Comprehension Skills

The first artifact I chose to present my Critical Thinking and Comprehension Skills was an assignment dealing with OPSEC, or Operations Security. I was able to demonstrate my understanding and ability to protect my critical information using a specific software.
