
Exploring Culture

Engaging in Communities



My favorite DB was DB 6: Familias diferentes because I felt like I got to know my classmates


Presentational Speaking

Most of my presentational speaking activities in this course came from Talk Abroad and speaking with the instructor. The textbook did have some speaking sections but I could never get feedback as to how I was truly doing. One of my biggest challenges was the speed of conversation. It was a total game changer from doing written work and textbook work to jumping into a full on real life conversation. Another hurdle of mine is doing it on camera. It's already uncomfortable enough having to speak a language you aren't comfortable with, but then seeing yourself on camera is a different form of self evaluation. Now that the course is over, I feel like I can learn Spanish at my own pace, in my own setting preference and be more comfortable. School and doing it knowing you're getting a grade for how you perform is beyond stressful.
