The Armed Forces Admit to Having Three UFO Sightings

Washington- The Navy confirmed the authenticity of three videos recorded by military aircraft in which unidentified flying objects, also called UFOs, can be seen. "The three videos (one from 2004 y two from 2015) show invasions of our military training areas by unidentified flying objects" pointed out by U.S. Naval spokesman, Joseph Gradisher, in an announcement released to various news stations in the country.

The unidentified flying objects, well known by the acronym UFO, are those aerial phenomena that can't be identified by the observer y whose origin continues to be unknown after an investigation. The three videos in question were publicized by the To The Stars Academy (TTSA) and the New York Times newspaper in December 2017 and March 2018. The first recording, from 2004 y known by experts as "FLIR1", show an oblong shaped object that accelerates out of the view of the sensors. In the video called "Gimbal", a crew member can be heard saying "look at that thing" referring to an object that they said then appeared to go against the wind in 2015. Finally in the last recording known as "Go Fast" from the year 2015, one can observe a flying object that appears to be over the water and you can hear members of the military asking "What the hell is that?" and "What is that, Man?"

The website, The Black Vault, dedicated to declassifying government documents, was the first to uncover what the Navy thought of as phenomenal sightings were considered UFOs by the team of specialists. In his statement, Gradisher explained that the first video was already "widely shared" in 2007 when a member of the crew shared it on the internet. However, he said that "he doesn't have information" about how the other two videos were released to the general public. "These videos are copies of official Naval images taken by Navy personnel that conduct training missions in military controlled airspace"
