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Introduction

After choosing my 12 photos, I categorized them into six pairs. The first group represents me as an academic. The next shows me as a friend. The third pair shows me as a member of various groups. The fourth pair is me as a performer, and the fifth is me as a family member. The final pair shows me as an individual.

The Academic

The photos in this pair show how I present myself as a scholarly person. One of the photos shows me and some classmates posing with Rick West, the mayor of Chesapeake, for a program called Mayor's Youth Day. The other photo depicts me and some classmates posing with Mae Jemison, the first black woman to go to space, at The Chesapeake Forum. In these photos, I am wearing professional attire, posing with good posture, and looking directly at the camera with a polite smile. The Friend

These photos easily represent my favorite part of myself. In the first of these, I am dressed for a spirit day at school with my friends, posing naturally with a big, genuine smile. I

The Group Member

The second photo is from the day I got my cap and gown and decided to take pictures on campus at ODU. I am standing on the roof of the parking garage, holding my cap from blowing away in the wind.
