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## The Scope of the Health Problem

cood insecurity is defined as a lack of consistent access to enough food for every terson in a household to live an active, health (Feeding America, 2022).

million people, including 12 million children experience food insecurity in the United States (ISDA).

Norfolk, Virginia is 14.6% for 2021, and 12.5% in 2019. The projected child food insecurity rate is 22.8% as opposed to 19.3% in





#### Target Population

Increase of food insecurity among families with children and communities of color.

African American and Hispanic families face higher rates of food insecurity due to systemic racial injustices.

Almost 50% of Norfolk consists of individuals who are Black (40%) or Hispanic (8.6%) (Census 2020).







#### Significance

Individuals that are food insecure are at a disproportionate risk of developing chronic diseases such as, type 2 diabetes, cardiovascular disease, hypertension, and mood disorders (Decker, Dominic, and Flynn, 2018).

Children living in food insecure homes are also more likely to develop obesity and face developmental problems than children who live in food secure homes (Healthy people 2020).









# Health Disparities and other Contributing Factors

Food insecurity is complex and multifactorial, it includes behavioral, social, cultural, environmental, and economic factors.

#### Driving factors include:

- Educational attainment
- Income
- Access to healthcare
- Environmental/Physical factors


Why: Reduce food insecurity and empower individuals to be more self-sufficient

The goal is to have 2 more Food Hubs by 2026 in Norfolk. One in Calvert Square and Oakleaf Forest public housing complexes.



#### Mission Statement

The mission is to provide low-income neighborhoods in Norfolk, Virginia with Food Hubs that immediately addresses food insecurity and provide additional resources that combat

the root causes of food insecurity which will empower individuals to become self-sufficient.





#### Goals and Objectives



Goal 1- Constantly increasing and providing healthy, quality produce to low-income

neighborhoods.

Objective 1: Identify local farmers, and community stakeholders that aid in provision of quality produce, food items and necessary toiletries.

-Objective 2: Diversify the produce and food options to cater to diets that will assist chronic disease management and prevention -Objective 3: Obtain funding for quality produce and other food items that will need to be purchased to ensure quality is always upheld

Goal 2- Provide resources that contribute to root cause issues such as housing, education, and healthcare.

-Objective 1: Identify and collaborate with community organizations to promote food security and physical health outcomes, such as partnerships with local YMCA or recreation centers

- -Objective 2: Enroll at least 30% of clientele that measure below the state poverty level into a training program that will increase their current income and skill set.
- -Objective 3: Collaborate with local community colleges and other higher educational institutions to provide financial aid to provide educational opportunities for participating clients.



#### Goals and Objectives

-Goal 3 increased awareness and education about the root causes and health disparities

associated with food insecurity.

- -Objective 1: Advocate for federal and state programs that are pivotal to providing food for families.
- -Objective 2: Distribute evidence-based materials, that have been developed through a culturally sensitive lens, to the community partners and clientele
- Objective 3: Collaborate with higher education partners and healthcare providers

to implement comprehensive solutions to identify and combat structural racism that contributes to health disparities.

#### Evaluation design

- Formative indicators
  - Number of meals provided
  - -Number of participants enrolled in programs/resources provided
  - -Number of community resources provided for root cause work.
- Summative outcome measurements
  - -Pounds of food distributed
  - -Families that report better quality of living after utilizing root cause resources
  - -Surveys to assess participants awareness and knowledge of healthy food and its association of food insecurity
- Summative impact measurements
  - -Percentage of participants that completed programs
  - -Percentage of participants that reported increase in yearly income
  - -Decrease prevalence of food insecurity in Norfolk, Virginia.





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
