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COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course offers students a **critical approach to interpreting the** European past. A fast-paced survey of European history from the emergence of Mesopotamian civilizations to the present, it focuses on the major intellectual, religious, social, cultural, political, environmental and scientific developments that have influenced the course of European history.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The course emphasizes critical thinking and research skills. Critical analysis of primary and secondary source materials will foster understanding of European history. Through lectures, readings, directed projects and written assignments students will:

- a) will learn how historians interpret major events, people, processes, and ideas from the past.
- b) will explain the importance of key historical concepts such as change and continuity over time, chronology, causation, historical context, and the difference between primary and secondary sources.
- c) will assess and analyze historical sources to construct an argument.
