

Pre-Reading Warm Up Activity

- Students create a K-W-L chart on their Civil Rights knowledge. To be displayed throughout the unit.
- Introduce your students to some of the riders and goals of Freedom Ride 1961. Watch the short documentary on the civil rights movement in the U.S.

Civil Rights Movement: Freedom Rides

Students will learn why several of the riders wanted to be a part of this event. By viewing just this short segment, your class will gain an understanding of the situation so they can get more from their study of *Twelve Days in May*. Discuss what they learned from the film and what questions it raised.



Bulletin Board Exercise

To be displayed on a bulletin board after completion:

- K-W-L Chart
- Students will create a biographical trading card of a civil rights activist.
- Students will create a collage of themselves using images to reflect why they matter.



Discussion Questions: Twelve Days in May: Freedom Ride 1961

Interpretive Questions

- Why was it important for the Freedom Riders to remain non-violent?
- Which photograph in Twelve Days in May was the most impactful to you and why?
- Why was it important that white men and women participate in the Freedom Ride?
- Look at the photograph on page 62. Do you think the children were willing participants or were they following the dictates of their parents?
- Why do you think Twelve Days in May focuses on the journey but not the arrival of the Freedom Riders?

Evaluative Questions

- Why do you think the author used just black and white fonts, photographs, cartoons, and backgrounds in the creation of this book?
- How does the author's writing journalistic writing style draw in the reader?
- Why was it important that the author included the age and race of each Freedom Rider?
- Do you think the author is presenting the material in a unbiased way? Why or why not?
- Is the author's purpose to solely inform or is this a call for action?

Discussion Questions: All Because You Matter

Interpretive Questions

- Who is the author talking about when she says, "They Mattered?"
- Who is someone who came before you that paved the way for you?
- What book have you read that was "like a mirror staring back at you?"


Evaluative Questions

- Why did the illustrator choose a black boy as the main character when the author does not indicate a specific race or gender?
- What is the significance of the petals on each page of the book?
- Why did the author use the English, Spanish and Tagalog language throughout the book?
- Why did the author use the specific names: "Trayvon, Tamir and Philandro?"

Discussion Question: Comparative

Comparative Questions

- Look at the picture on page 44 of Twelve Days in May. What would Hank Thomas tell the little boy in All Because You Matter?
- How is racism addressed in both Twelve Days in May and in All Because You Matter?
- Which of these books feels more hopeful to you?
 Why?





SOL Activities: Grade 7 History & Social Studies

US II.9 The student will apply social science skills to understand the key domestic and international issues during the second half of the twentieth and early twenty-first centuries by

a) examining the impact of the Civil Rights Movement.

- The four Supreme Court decisions that are presented in *Twelve Days in May* laid the foundation for the May 1961 Freedom Ride. Each student should complete a chart with the following information: Date, Case, Issue, Decision.
- Who were the original thirteen Freedom Riders? We know their names, and your students have read short biographies of them on pages 88–97, but your students can research the riders to learn more. Students create a trading card or magazine cover using the <u>Big Huge Labs</u> image tools with information about the activist.
- Students examine the specific tactics of the civil rights movement: marches, hunger strikes, sit-ins, boycotts, etc. Students pick two instances to display in a large Venn Diagram. For example, the lunch counter sit-in in Greensboro, NC and the Montgomery bus boycott. Include type of protest, participants, location, initial response, final results.

SOL Activities: Grade 7 Reading

7.5 The student will read and demonstrate comprehension of a variety of fictional texts, narrative nonfiction, and poetry.

- d) Describe the impact of word choice, imagery, and literary devices including figurative language,
- k) Identify cause and effect relationships
- g) Make inferences and draw conclusions based on the text.
- Students take a class vote on which images are more powerful motivation for social justice: the photographs
 from Twelve Days in May or the illustrations in All Because You Matter. Class discussion on the strengths
 and weakness of the two types of images.
- Half the students will identify examples from the text in All Because You Matter to demonstrate the motivation for the Freedom Riders in Twelve Days in May. Half of the students will identify examples from the text in Twelve Days in May to demonstrate the motivation of the Black Lives Matter movement highlighted in All Because You Matter. Students from the two sections will Pair and Share their findings.
- Both of the books are inspiration for change. Students will think of a time when they thought one thing but then something happened that made them realize that their thinking might have been wrong and what they learned from that experience. Students complete a chart with the information: I Thought, What Happened, I Learned.

SOL Activities: Grade 7 Research

7.9 The student will apply knowledge of appropriate reference materials to produce a research product.

- a) Collect and organize information from multiple sources including online, print and media.
- b) Evaluate the validity and authenticity of sources.
- c) Use technology as a tool to research, organize, evaluate, and communicate information.
- d) Cite primary and secondary sources.
- The school librarian will show students the <u>Google Chrome Extension Cite Sources Video</u> for instruction on citing sources and checking the authenticity of sources. The librarian will answer questions on proper citation.
- In the Library, students will research images of the Freedom Riders that were not included in *Twelve Days in May* and write a persuasive letter to author Larry Dane Brimner why that photo should have been included.
 Students will cite the images the choose.
- In the Library, students will research civil right activist John Lewis and create memorial in his honor using at least one primary source and one secondary source. Sources will be cited.

SOL Activities: Grade 7 Visual Arts

- 7.1 The student will use, and record in a sketchbook/journal, steps of the art-making process, including research, to create works of art.
 - Students will choose photographs and illustrations to create a collage that reflects "Why They Matter"

7.11 The student will analyze how art and culture influence each other.

- Students will identify the cultural references in the illustrations of All Because You Matter.





Illustrator Information: Bryan Collier
